Question for Pastor...

"The colors on the altar have been different almost every week. White, then red, then white then green. Why?"

That's a great question. There actually is a "rhyme and a reason" to our color scheme. We talked in a recent Sunday moming Bible study about how traditions have meaning and purpose, but unless people know the meaning and purpose, those traditions just become meaningless rituals. "That's the way it's supposed to be," or "Because we've always done it that way," are not good answers.

The colors of the paraments on the altar and of the stole that I wear are the traditional colors for the various seasons and celebration days of the Church Year. It's kind of like how we use different colors in our homes at different times in the calendar year. For example, we traditionally use green and red around Christmas, brown and orange at Thanksgiving, red, white and blue next weekend for Independence Day.

There is one major difference, however. The colors in the sanctuary are not merely there for decoration or to 'add color for the sake of adding color'. The liturgical colors are there to remind us of our God - some attribute or action of His. Here's a brief explanation of how those colors direct our focus to God....

White - is the color of purity and holiness, celebration and joy. Thus, it is the appropriate color for the special days that celebrate Jesus and His work - Christmas, Epiphany (arrival of the wise men), Easter, Transfiguration and Ascension. The white color also carries through the whole seasons of Christmas (12 days) and Easter (50 days). White is used on Thanksgiving Day as a reminder that we have not gathered to thank "our lucky stars," but to focus on God as the "giver of all good gifts."

Purple - has since ancient times been the color of royalty. It is the color you will see on the altar during the Advent season, those four weeks in December where we prepare to celebrate Jesus - the King of kings - coming to live among us. Purple is also the color of the 40-day season of Lent which leads us up to Good Friday and Easter. The 'royalty color' serves to reminds us that the One who died for us is no less than the King of all creation.

Red - is the color of fire. It highlights the power of the Holy Spirit who came upon the first disciples the form of tongues of fire (see Acts chapter 2). Thus, red is the color you will see on Pentecost Day, Confirmation Sunday (it is the through the power of the Holy Spirit that the confirmands have come to profess their faith in the Triune God) and Reformation Sunday (again, it was through the power of the Holy Spirit that Martin Luther and the other church reformers brought the church back to the truth that we are saved not by works or payments, but by God's grace through faith in Jesus and what He did for us on the cross).

Green - is the color of life and things that grow. It helps us remember that God is the source of both our life on earth and our eternal life. It also serves to remind us that His goal for us throughout life is to grow - in our understanding of Him and our faith in Him. You will notice green on the altar the majority of the time. Green is the color for the Epiphany Season (the one after Christmas) whose emphasis is on sowing the seeds of the Gospel in the lives of the people around us. Green is also the color of the Pentecost season (which lasts roughly half a year from Pentecost Day to Advent in early December). It is during this season that we highlight the words and works of Jesus during His ministry on earth and seek to grow in our understanding of and trust in Him.

Rev. Dr. Daniel and Dr. Joan Jastram, Serving the Lord in Northern Asia

(And speaking at Living Word on Sunday, July 5!)



Rev. Dr. Daniel and Dr. Joan Jastram serve the Lord as career missionaries through The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) in northern Asia, based in Tokyo, Japan. In this role, Daniel helps develop and implement a strategic mission plan for this area. He coordinates theological education opportunities and also supervises and evaluates theological educators throughout northern Asia. When needed, Daniel teaches courses at

Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary, Tokyo.

Daniel was born in Shibata, Japan, and raised overseas in an LCMS missionary family. His childhood congregation was Shibata Lutheran Church, Japan. He received a bachelor's degree from the University of South Dakota, Vermillion, and both a master's degree and a doctorate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He received his Master of Divinity from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind. Before serving in Asia, he was a professor of theology at Concordia University, St. Paul, St. Paul, Minn., and Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon. He also served as sole pastor of Messiah Lutheran Church, Forest Lake, Minn. In his free time, Daniel enjoys reading, hiking and bookbinding.

Joan was born in Mitchell, S.D., where her childhood congregation was Zion Lutheran Church. She received both a bachelor's and a master's degree from the University of South Dakota, Vermillion. She received her Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) degree from the Minnesota School of Professional Psychology at Argosy University, Twin Cities, Minn. Before her missionary service in Asia, Joan worked as a clinical psychologist and plans to continue in this capacity. Joan enjoys reading, hiking and cooking in her free time.


Summer Reading Program for Kids...

From the Synod President...

A one-person majority of the U.S. Supreme Court got it wrong again. Some 40 years ago, a similarly activist court legalized the killing of children in the womb. That decision has to date left a wake of some 55 million Americans dead. Today, the Court has imposed same-sex marriage upon the whole nation in a similar fashion. Five justices cannot determine natural or divine law. Now shall come the time of testing for Christians faithful to the Scriptures and the divine institution of marriage (Matthew 19:3-6), and indeed, a time of testing much more intense than what followed Roe v. Wade.

Like Roe v. Wade, this decision will be followed by a rash of lawsuits. Through coercive litigation, governments and popular culture continue to make the central post-modern value of sexual freedom override "the free exercise of religion" enshrined in the Bill of Riahts.

The ramifications of this decision are seismic. Proponents will seek to drive Christians and Christian institutions out of education at all levels: they will press laws to force faithful Christian institutions and individuals to violate consciences in work practices and myriad other ways. We will have much more to say about this.

During some of the darkest days of Germany, a faithful Lutheran presciently described how governments lose their claim to legitimate authority according to Romans 13.

The Caesar cult in its manifold forms, the deification of the state, is one great form of the defection from the [true] idea of the state. There are also other possibilities of such defection. The government can forget and neglect its tasks. When it no longer distinguishes between right and wrong, when its courts are no longer governed by the strict desire for justice, but by special interests, when government no longer has the courage to exercise its law, fails to exercise its duties, undermines its own legal order, when it weakens through its family law parental authority and the estate of marriage, then it ceases to be governing authority.

Raising such a question can lead to heavy conflicts of conscience. But it is fundamentally conceivable, and it has time and again become reality in history, that a governing authority has ceased to be governing authority. In such a case there may indeed exist a submission to a superior power. But the duty of obedience against this power no longer exists. [Hermann Sasse, "What Is the State?"(1932)]

As faithful Christians, we shall continue to be obedient to just laws.

We affirm the human rights of all individuals and the inherent and equal value of all people. We respect the divinely given dignity of all people, no matter their sexual preference. We recognize that under the exacting and demanding laws of God, we are indeed sinners in thought, word and deed, just as are all (Romans 3:9ff.). We confess that the "blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanses us from all our sins" (1 John 1:7). We confess that God's divine law of marriage and the entire Ten Commandments apply to all, and that so also the life-giving sacrifice of Christ on the cross is for all. It is a "righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe" (Romans 3:22).

However, even as we struggle as a church to come to a unified response to this blatant rejection of the entire history of humankind and its practice of marriage, "We shall obey God rather than man"(Acts 5:29). Christians will now begin to learn what it means to be in a state of solemn conscientious objection against the state. We will resist its imposition of falsehood upon us, even as we continue to reach out to those who continue to be harmed by the ethic of radical sexual freedom, detached from God's blessing of marriage. And we will stand shoulder to shoulder with Christians, churches and people of good will who are resolute on this issue.

God help us. Amen. Pastor Matthew C. Harrison



E-Mail Inspiration... (received via e-mail) "God's Got It."

That's what my favorite farmer says here, almost daily, on this farm. It's been his mantra for as long as he's worked those fields. His philosophy for farming has become a theology for living.

God is God, and God is good, and God has actually "got it."

This is not just a cute catch-phrase, but an actual way to habitually remember that there is a King in Heaven who holds all things together - even when life stings.

When worry.

When cancer.

When inadequacy.

When pain.

When drought.

When storm.

That's when He's got it. Always.

We repeat it to ourselves, on the bad crop years, and when the diagnoses come, and when we've gathered in hospice rooms, and over hospital beds, and in ugly days of wild uncertainty. It's true: What we say to ourselves, and to one another, can determine whether we will live imprisoned or free.

Because dark days will come. In this world we will have trouble, but what did Jesus say? " Take heart, for I have overcome the world."

So we tell it to each other, over and over again: God's got it.

It's why we return to the table of grace with the cup and the loaf. "Do this in remembrance of me," are the words etched into the altar. We return and remember and receive and repent and repeat. God's got it. He has actually and miraculously overcome the world.

We believe this...

- that Jesus was born of the Holy Spirit, that He came to Earth, and that He died on a cross, and that when Satan was laughing and the disciples were running scared, God actually and miraculously still had it.
- that Jesus was wrapped in a cloth and buried in a tomb, and a stone was rolled into place. And when His followers grieved and

Story Behind The Song...

"The Star Spangled Banner"

You may remember learning in school that our National Anthem was written by Francis Scott Key during the Battle of Baltimore in the War of 1812. Here are some additional facts that you may not

- 1. Key's original title was called the "Defense of Fort McHenry."
- It is commonly believed that Francis Scott Key wrote "The Star-Spangled Banner" as a poem that was later set to music, but this is not the case, according to Dr. David Hildebrand, the director of

"The structure doesn't match any poem," Hildebrand says about Key's words, Early copies of "The Star-Spangled Banner" simply included the lyrics because the tune was already so well known, Hildebrand explains.

The origins for "The Star-Spangled Banner" tune came from "The Anacreontic Song" -- a theme song of sorts composed by John Stafford Smith for the Anacreontic Society, an 18th century amateur musicians' club for men (male glee club). "The Anacreontic Song" is also sometimes called "To Anacreon in Heaven," which is also the opening line. It is one of many songs written to the same music. About a hundred different songs have been written to the melody of "The Anacreontic Song," Hildebrand says.

- 3. It didn't become the official national anthem until 1931. While "The Star-Spangled Banner" was popular during the 1800s, the song didn't become the national anthem until the early 1930s. The military had adopted it for ceremonial purposes decades earlier, but it took legislation signed in 1931 by President Herbert Hoover to make it official.
- 4. We only sing the first of four stanzas. Here is the complete version of "The Star-Spangled Banner" showing spelling and punctuation

from Francis Scott Kev's manuscript in the Maryland Historical Society collection. Note the final verse that gives credit to God for the victory.

O say can you see, by the dawn's early light. What so proudly we hail'd at the twilight's last gleaming, Whose broad stripes and bright stars through the perilous fiaht

O'er the ramparts we watch'd were so gallantly streaming? And the rocket's red glare, the bomb bursting in air, Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there, O say does that star-spangled banner yet wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

On the shore dimly seen through the mists of the deep Where the foe's haughty host in dread silence reposes, What is that which the breeze, o'er the towering steep, As it fitfully blows, half conceals, half discloses? Now it catches the gleam of the morning's first beam. In full glory reflected now shines in the stream, 'Tis the star-spangled banner - O long may it wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!
