



# Question for Pastor...

What do you think about the proposed Gay Marriage law?

I'm not sure there's enough room in one newsletter to do justice to all aspects of that question, but here are a few of my thoughts:



It really doesn't matter what I think. The only thing that matters is: What does God think?

We live in a society where we are encouraged to give our opinion on everything. American Idol contestants are chosen based on "What we think." Talk Radio thrives on "What we think." We are encouraged to write comments about every article we read in the online newspaper - and if we don't feel like posting a comment we are encouraged to give our "thumbs up" or "thumbs down" reaction to the comments that are made. We have the opportunity to "like" all sorts of pictures and posts on Facebook and are urged to do so (and maybe even feel guilty if we don't).

In this environment where extreme importance is placed on our personal opinions, it is so very crucial to remember that if God has spoken on the particular subject then our opinion doesn't "amount to a hill of beans." (If you're not sure what that old saying means, go ask your parents.)

And God has certainly spoken on both the subject of homosexuality and the subject of marriage. In Leviticus chapter 20 God calls homosexual acts "detestable." In Romans chapter 1 He refers to



them as a "perversion" - not the way He designed things to be.

After God created the first man, Adam, and brought all the animals to him, Adam realized there was still something very necessary missing in his life. So what did God create to fill that "empty spot"? Another guy? No! He created the first woman, Eve. Right away in the second chapter of the Bible God describes marriage: "For this reason (the reason that man and woman are incomplete without each other) a man shall leave His father and mother and be united to his wife, and they will become one flesh." Jesus quoted that verse when asked about marriage and divorce in Mark chapter 10.

It seems to me that a logical, argument can be made for just about any side of an issue. You've probably heard some of the "logical" arguments people have made in favor of gay marriage. But you cannot make a biblical argument for gay marriage. The Bible is quite clear that God created man for a lifelong relationship with a woman, and vice versa. The Bible is also quite clear that homosexuality is not something God is "ok" with.

In confirmation classes, I try to impart lots of biblical principles to the students. One principle that I hammer away at over and over is this:

"Do what God wants and good things will happen. Don't do what God wants and bad things will happen."

That's a basic truth of life.

Gay marriage (or a gay lifestyle apart from marriage) is not God's will. If it becomes legal and thus is encouraged as a viable option, you can be assured there will be bad consequences for adults, kids, society in general. It really is as simple as that.

But there are a couple thoughts I have that may be worth sharing as well:

The first is an attempt to answer the objection:

But if they are born "that way" aren't we discriminating?

First of all, it appears to me that homosexuality is primarily a choice - one that society is currently promoting. But, for the sake of argument, let's say there is a physical propensity toward being homosexual. The following is from Rev. John Piper as quoted in World Magazine (with some explanatory comments added by me in italics)

"Having a physical root makes nothing right. Physically based, aggressive tendencies may lead to violent behavior, but we don't condone it. Physically based lethargic tendencies may lead to laziness and neglect, but we don't condone it. Frenetic tendencies may lead to disruption and workaholism which we try to correct. A gloomy bent may lead to suicidal thoughts, and we try to fix that. An anxious bent may lead to paranoia and we try to fix that. Addictive tendencies may lead to alcoholism or bondage to gambling or deadly smoking - all conditions that we try to discourage and correct. A low frustration threshold may lead to outbursts of rage which we discourage. Strong sexual desires may lead to adultery or polygamy - which is prohibited due to the detrimental effect on society.

In other words, in a world where the effect of sin permeates to the roots of nature and disorders all of life, we cannot define as good and natural whatever has physical roots. There must be a higher norm than fallen nature. There are many physically based abnormalities in the world. Therefore having a physical base or root is not sufficient reason for condoning anything as natural or good. "

The other thought I'd like to share is that there's one thing that really bothers me about our opposition to homosexuality and gay marriage. I fear that most of the opposition doesn't often come from a sincere desire to help others do God's will. More likely it comes from a desire to point fingers at a sin that is "safe" for us to oppose, because it's a sin that doesn't ever tempt us.

If we are truly so concerned about doing God's will, why aren't we loudly voicing our opposition to, for example, lying? As just one example, we find politicians lie to us quite frequently, and we expect it! Don't we even like it when they lie to us - as long as what they tell us is something that we want to hear? Or why don't we voice our opposition to gossip, for example?

The answer seems obvious to me. We choose homosexuality as a lightning rod for our opposition, because we cannot ever see ourselves engaging in it. But lying, gossiping, etc...? It's hard to oppose something you can see yourself doing - even though you know you shouldn't.

We need to remember that our opposition to gay marriage must not come from a "holier than thou" attitude. We need to first repent of that attitude - and the sins we find ourselves drawn to.

CTI...
CTI VISION:

CTI is a community of young people who combine their common passion for music with their mutual desire to share the love of Christ, and a vehicle through which these young people are trained, equipped and mobilized into ministry opportunities where they can use their gifting to impact their generation.

#### CTI SUMMER PROGRAM:

During the months of June, July, and August, we train and mobilize several short-term teams to minister internationally. These teams partner with existing ministries (usually Youth for Christ or Youth With a Mission) in support of their mission to reach the youth of their country with the Gospel.

Summer teams give concerts in schools, prisons, orphanages, street corners, parks, churches, and any other location where our partners are working. Team members use the impact of music to share their faith with young people in the host culture and connect them with our ministry partners and the local church.

The teams go at the invitation of our hosts. They support the efforts of our partner ministry through their focus on sevanthood, modeling the example of Jesus, who did not come to be served, but to serve.

The summer program is an experience through which participants grow in Christian character and servant posture, deepen their understanding of the Great Commission, and learn to actively share their faith. At the conclusion of the experience, team members return home with a more missional mindset, an expanded world-view, a deeper understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Christ, and a desire to impact others with what God has shown them.

Participants in our summer program must be at least 16 years old by the beginning of their training. Applications will be individually considered for exceptionally qualified 15-year-olds who will turn 16 during the summer of their participation. Applicants who are married or over the age of 30 will be considered on a case-by-case basis.





# Could You Give Away Your Last Dollar?

On Easter Sunday Bethany arrived at church with only 10 baht (33 cents) to her name. That was enough to get home, but not enough

to buy the food and water that she so desperately needed. The only thing that she knew to do was pray, asking God to provide for her needs.

At the service another refugee walked up to her and handed her 100 baht (\$3.33) saying, "I feel like I am supposed to give this to you." Bethany rejoiced while knowing in her heart that this was not her money to keep. She gave thanks saying, "God, I give this money back to you," as she slipped it into the offering bucket.

The very next day Bethany received 1,000 baht (\$33)!

Her story reminds me of the woman in Mark 12:41-43



"Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crown putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came in and put in two small mites (a fraction of a penny).

Calling his disciples to

him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They gave out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty, put everything in-all that she had to live on."

Bethany made a great sacrifice in the midst of her great need. She stepped out in courage and faith, fully trusting God to meet her needs when it didn't look logistically possible. I can't help but wonder if I would have that same courage and faith. If I am to be completely honest, I don't think that I would at this point. But I pray to God that someday I will. Now I challenge you to ask yourself—would you?

Over the past year, the Link has been involved in researching and collaborating to

find solutions to homelessness in our community. Two options have been identified to meet the local need:

- Increasing motel capacity to serve households experiencing homelessness in partnership with Heartland Community Action Agency, Inc. through a designated fund
- Forming of new affiliate organization called Family Promise of Kandivohi County.

#### Quick facts about homelessness:

- Did you know that in October 2012, there were 10 214 people in Minnesota that were homeless? Experts note the actual number is higher since the number only reflects people that could be found in homeless situations and
- On January 23, 2013, 36 people were homeless in Kandiyohi County; the majority of the people experiencing homeless were families.

Family Promise is unique because it engages communities of faith to open their doors and host families in the evening. A Family Promise van brings families to school, work or to the day center in the moming for the day. Churches

provide hospitality: meals, fellowship and overnight accommodations. The project serves 3-5 families at a time. To learn more about Family Promise, visit their website: http:// www.familypromise.org/ Currently, Family Promise has affiliates in Brainerd, Anoka County, Rochester, Minneapolis and Cambridge. Thirteen partner congregations are needed as hosts to launch the project.

#### ATTITUDE IS EVERYTHING

Jerry was the kind of guy you love to hate. He was always in a good mood and always had something positive to say. When someone would ask him how he was doing, he would reply, "If I were any better, I would be twins!"

He was a unique manager because he had several waiters who had followed him around from restaurant to restaurant. The reason the waiters followed Jerry was because of his attitude. He was a natural motivator. If an employee was having a bad day, Jerry was there telling the employee how to look on the positive side of the situation.

Seeing this style really made me curious, so one day I went up to Jerry and asked him, "I don't get it! You can't be a positive person all of the time. How do you do it?" Jerry replied, "Each morning I wake up and say to myself, Jerry, you have two choices today. You can choose to be in a good mood or you can choose to be in a bad mood.' I choose to be in a good mood.

Each time something bad happens, I can choose to be a victim or I can choose to learn from it. I choose to learn from it. Every time someone comes to me complaining, I can choose to accept their complaining or I can point out the positive side of life. I choose the positive side of life."

"Yeah, right, it's not that easy," I protested.

"Yes it is," Jerry said. "Life is all about choices. When you cut away all the junk, every situation is a choice. You choose how you react to situations. You choose how people will affect your mood. You choose to be in a good mood or bad mood. The bottom line: It's your choice how you live life." I reflected on what Jerry said. Soon thereafter, I left the restaurant industry to start my own business. We lost touch, but often thought about him when I made a choice about life instead of reacting to it.

Several years later, I heard that Jerry did something you are never supposed to do in a restaurant business: he left the back door open one morning and was held up at gunpoint by three armed robbers. While trying to open the safe, his hand, shaking from nervousness, slipped off the combination. The robbers panicked and shot him. Luckily, Jerry was found relatively quickly and rushed to the local trauma center.

After 18 hours of surgery and weeks of intensive care, Jerry

was released from the hospital with fragments of the bullets still in his body. I saw Jerry about six months after the accident. When I asked him how he was, he replied, "If I were any better, I'd be twins. Wanna see my scars?"

I declined to see his wounds, but did ask him what had gone through his mind as the robbery took place. "The first thing that went through my mind was that I should have locked the back door," Jerry replied. "Then, as I lay on the floor, I remembered that I had two choices: I could choose to live, or I could choose to die. I chose to live.

"Weren't you scared? Did you lose consciousness?" I asked. Jerry continued, "The paramedics were great. They kept telling me I was going to be fine. But when they wheeled me into the emergency room and I saw the expressions on the faces of the doctors and nurses, I got really scared. In their eyes, I read, 'He's a dead man." I knew I needed to take action."

"What did you do?" I asked.

"Well, there was a big, burly nurse shouting questions at me," said Jerry. "She asked if I was allergic to anything. 'Yes,' I replied. The doctors and nurses stopped working as they waited for my reply. I took a deep breath and yelled, 'Bullets!' Over their laughter, I told them, 'I am choosing to live. Operate on me as if I am alive, not dead."

Jerry lived thanks to the skill of his doctors, but also because of his amazing attitude. I learned from him that every day we have the choice to live fully. Attitude, after all, is everything.

# Story Behind The Song...

"Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee"

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, JOY . . . " Galatians 5:22

This hymn is generally considered by hymnologists to be one of the most joyous expressions of hymn lyrics in the English language. Its author, Henry van Dyke, was born at Germantown, Pennsylvania, on November 10, 1852. During his lifetime he had quite a list of "claims to fame." He was recognized as one of the ablest Presbyterian preachers and leading liturgy figures in America. In addition to achieving fame as a preacher, he served as a professor of literature at Princeton University from 1900-1923, became a Navy chaplain during World War 1, and represented his country as an ambassador to Holland and Luxembourg under an appointment by President Wilson. He was a prolific writer of devotional material with many of his books being best-sellers.

But the one legacy that has stood the test of time is his hymn, "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee." Van Dyke stated the purpose for writing this hymn as follows:

"These verses are simple expressions of common Christian feelings and desires in this present time, hymns of today that may be sung together by people who know the thought of the age, and are not afraid that any truth of science will destroy their religion or that any revolution on earth will overthrow the kingdom of heaven. Therefore this is a hymn of trust and hope."

The final stanza concludes with an invitation for all of God's children to join the mighty chorus of joy begun at creation's dawn (Job 38:7) and, in so doing, to find the encouragement needed for any circumstance of life.

The text for this hymn was written while van Dyke was a guest preacher at Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts. It is said that one morning van Dyke handed the manuscript to the college president, saying, "Here is a hymn for you. Your mountains (the Berkshires) were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven's "Hymn of Joy.' "It was first included in van Dyke's Book of Poems, published in 1911.

The tune, "Hymn of Joy," comes out of the final movement of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, composed from 1817-23, and published in 1826. Although Beethoven never wrote a tune specifically for a hymn text, a number have been adapted from his many famous works. This is the most widely used of these adopted hymn tunes.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, JOY . . . ." Galatians 5:22

Joyful, joyful, we adore Thee, God of glory, Lord of love; Hearts unfold like flowers before Thee, opening to the sun above. Melt the clouds of sin and sadness; drive the dark of doubt away; Giver of immortal gladness, fill us with the light of day!

All Thy works with joy surround Thee, earth and heaven reflect Thy rays, Stars and angels sing around Thee, center of unbroken praise. Field and forest, vale and mountain, flowery meadow, flashing sea, Singing bird and flowing fountain call us to rejoice in Thee.
